Main methods used to raise funds:

This year BCAC received a Lotteries grant to support the maintenance of its website and the distribution of the Step by Step resource pack. A grant to support Aucklanders with metastatic breast cancer was received from the Louisa and Patrick Emmett Murphy Foundation. Public donations were received throughout the year. Donations were also received from Lachlan McKenzie who ran a marathon to raise funds, and Australian health and beauty company Le Reve. The BCAC does not use a third party to raise funds. It does not charge a fee for membership and it does not require payment for the goods and services it supplies.

Reliance on volunteers and donated goods and services:

The BCAC relies on gifts of volunteer time and expertise to administer the Society and to carry out its purposes, e.g. researching current evidence-based information about breast cancer detection, treatment and care and promoting and supporting such research; representing those affected by breast cancer in Aotearoa New Zealand to parliament, the health system, the scientific and medical communities, media, corporate entities and the general public; providing consumer input and representation at regional and national levels to the development of policies and strategies affecting those with breast cancer in Aotearoa New Zealand; and facilitating connections and networks of people and organisations sharing similar issues, concerns and experiences in relation to breast cancer.

Outcomes:


Inform and support those diagnosed with breast cancer by providing evidence-based information to help them and their families make informed decisions about their treatment and care.

Basis of Preparation

The Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. has elected to apply PBE SFR-A (NFP) Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting - Accrual (Not-For-Profit) on the basis that it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses of equal to or less than \$2,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. is registered for GST (no. 95-344-461). All amounts are recorded exclusive of GST, except for Debtors and Creditors which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

The Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank Accounts and Cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Income Tax

The Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. has charitable status and is therefore exempt from income tax.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

TO THE COMMITTEE MEMBERS OF BREAST CANCER AOTEAROA COALITION INC.

Report on the Performance Report

I have audited the performance report of Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. on pages 1 to 10, which comprises the entity information, the statement of service performance, the statement of financial performance and statement of cash flows for the year ended 31 March 2020, the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2020, and the statement of accounting policies and other explanatory information

Opinion

In my opinion:

- a) The reported outcomes and outputs, and quantification of the outputs to the extent practicable, in the statement of service performance are suitable;
- b) The performance report on pages 1 to 10, present fairly, in all material respects the entity information and service performance for the year then ended, and the financial position of Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. as at 31 March 2020, and its financial performance, and cash flows for the year then ended

in accordance with Public Benefit Entity Simple Format Reporting – Accrual (Not-For-Profit) issued by the New Zealand Accounting standards Board.

Basis for Opinion

I conducted my audit of the statement of financial performance, the statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) (ISAs (NZ), and the audit of the entity information and statement of service performance in accordance with the International Standard on Assurance Engagements (New Zealand) ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised). My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the *Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Performance Report* section of my report. I am independent of Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 (Revised) *Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners* issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

Other than in my capacity as auditor, I have no relationship with, or interests in Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc.

The Responsibility of the Management Committee for the Performance Report

The Management Committee are responsible on behalf of the entity for:

- a) Identifying outcomes and outputs, and quantifying the outputs to the extent practicable, that are relevant, reliable, comparable and understandable, to report in the statement of service performance;
- b) The preparation and fair presentation of the performance report which comprises the entity information, the statement of service performance, and the statement of financial performance, the statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report, in accordance with Public Benefit Simple Format Reporting Accrual (Not-For-Profit) issued in New Zealand by the New Zealand Accounting Standards Board, and
- c) For such internal control as the Management Committee determine is necessary, to enable the preparation of the performance report that is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the performance report, the Management Committee are responsible on behalf of Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. for assessing the Society's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless the Management Committee either intend to liquidate Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. or to cease operations, or have no alternative but to do so.



Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Performance Report

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the performance report is free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with ISAs (NZ) and ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised) will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of the performance report.

As part of an audit in accordance with ISAs (NZ) and ISAE (NZ) 3000 (Revised), I exercise professional judgement and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the performance report whether due to fraud or error, design, and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may be collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of the use of the going concern basis of accounting by the Management Committee and, based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Society's ability to continue to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor's report to the related disclosures in the performance report or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor's report. However, future events or conditions may cause the Society to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the performance report, including the disclosures, and
 whether the performance report represents the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair
 presentation.
- Perform procedures to obtain evidence about and evaluate whether the reported outcomes and outputs, and quantification of the outputs to the extent practicable, are relevant, reliable, comparable and understandable.

I communicate with the Management Committee regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit and significant audit findings, including any significant deficiencies in internal control that I identify during my audit.
