Mission

To make world-class detection, treatment and care accessible to all those affected by breast cancer in Aotearoa, New Zealand.

To provide information and support to empower those with breast cancer to make informed choices about their treatment and care.

To provide a voice for New Zealanders who have experienced breast cancer.

Structure

The BCAC operates according to a formal Constitution.

Governance arrangements

The BCAC has a Managing Committee comprising: Chairperson, Deputy Chairperson, Secretary, Treasurer and further members as decided by the Society. Only Members of the BCAC may be Committee Members. Committee Members are appointed by majority vote at a General Meeting. There is no fixed term for Committee membership. If the position of any Committee Member becomes vacant between General Meetings, the Committee may appoint another Committee Member to fill that vacancy until the next General Meeting.

Relationships to other entities

There are no other entities controlled by the BCAC.

The BCAC operates as an umbrella organisation, representing and providing support and information to individuals and groups with an interest in improving outcomes for New Zealanders experiencing breast cancer. The BCAC has a coordinating role, facilitating communication and cooperation among its member groups.

Reliance on volunteers and donated goods or services

The BCAC relies on gifts of volunteer time and expertise to administer the Society and to carry out its purposes, e.g. researching current evidence-based information about breast cancer detection, treatment and care and promoting and supporting such research; providing support to New Zealanders experiencing breast cancer by distributing a free informative support pack; maintaining a website with evidence-based relevant information, advice and news; distributing a regular free electronic newsletter; posting relevant news on BCAC's Facebook page; running an online peer support group for those experiencing breast cancer; promoting the activities of its 30 breast cancer.

related member groups; helping individuals in difficulty to connect with appropriate service providers; representing those affected by breast cancer in Aotearoa New Zealand to parliament, the health system, the scientific and medical communities, media, corporate entities and the general public; providing consumer input and representation at regional and national levels to the development of policies and strategies affecting those with breast cancer in Aotearoa New Zealand; and facilitating connections and networks of people and organisations sharing similar issues, concerns and experiences in relation to breast cancer.

The BCAC does not rely on donated goods or services.

Membership

BCAC Members may be Ordinary, Corporate or Life Members. Individuals and groups, including other registered charities, interested achieving the BCAC's mission make up the membership. A register of members is kept and is reported at the BCAC's Annual General Meeting.

Main sources of cash and resources

The BCAC's activities are funded by donations and grants from individuals, businesses, other charities, NGOs and government entities, bequests and interest on savings.

Main methods used to raise funds

This year BCAC continued to receive regular donations from the public, often in memory of women who had been significant supporters of BCAC's work. A direct bequest was also received. A fundraiser in support of young women with breast cancer contributed significantly, as did sponsorship of a runner in the Auckland marathon. The balance of a Lotteries grant received in 2023 continued to support the maintenance of BCAC's website, distribution of the Step by Step resource pack, and liaison with member groups and healthcare providers. Interest from term deposit investments made mainly with funds received via bequests in previous years also contributed to BCAC's revenue this year. BCAC does not use a third party to raise funds. It does not charge a fee for membership and it does not require payment for the goods and services it supplies.

Statement of Service Performance

For the Year Ended 31st March 2024

Medium to long term objectives

- Inform and support those diagnosed with breast cancer by providing evidence-based information to help them and their families make informed decisions about their treatment and care.
- Represent the views of women with breast cancer to clinicians, health officials, regulators, policymakers and other relevant decision-makers to ensure world-class detection, treatment and care is available in New Zealand.
- Promote breast awareness for women of all ages and regular breast screening from age 40 onwards.
- Advocate for improvements in breast cancer risk assessment and screening.
- Advocate for better access to modern medicines and other treatments for early and metastatic breast cancer.
- Improve breast cancer outcomes for Māori and Pasifika women by consulting and engaging with these communities.
- Network to ensure communication and sharing of resources and information among breast cancer-related groups and organisations.

Key activities

Activity 1. Make world class detection, treatment and care accessible to all those affected by breast cancer in Aotearoa New Zealand:

- Continue engagement with decision makers at all levels
- Continue to update our knowledge of effective treatments through interaction with medical experts and attendance at research meetings
- Support the establishment and implementation of Quality Performance Indicators for breast cancer
- Support the development and implementation of NZ Guidelines for Advanced Breast Cancer
- Raise awareness of new and emerging medicines and the need for increased medicines funding
- Meet with Pharmac to champion access to new and innovative medicines proven to deliver results
- Meet with pharmaceutical companies and encourage them to import and register their innovative medicines in New Zealand, apply for Pharmac funding and offer them at affordable prices in cost-share patient access programmes and free of charge to patients when funding is imminent
- Continually review the performance of the Cancer Control Agency Te Aho o Te Kahu and provide patient-focused input
- Advocate for new ways that breast cancer care can be provided to improve outcomes

- Consult, engage with, empower and, when appropriate, represent Māori and Pasifika
 women on breast issues and advocate for actions needed to increase access to services, and
 improve breast cancer experiences and outcomes
- Increase education and knowledge of breast cancer, treatments, supportive care and emerging clinical trial results by attending and promoting local and international expert meetings and conferences
- Advocate for the establishment of schemes enabling early and broader medicines access
- Engage and network with the key stakeholders across the health system to encourage and support consumer, Māori, and Pacific involvement and participation in breast cancer clinical research and its translation by partnering at a governance, local/regional level
- Continue networking and collaboration among groups and individuals.

- Widely distribute Step by Step to women newly diagnosed with breast cancer throughout NZ

- Continue to support the Metavivors NZ and Metavivors NZ Action Facebook groups

Basis of Preparation

This performance report is prepared in accordance with the XRB's Tier 3 (NFP) Standard. INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

TO THE COMMITTEE MEMBERS OF BREAST CANCER AOTEAROA COALITION INC.

Report on the Performance Report

I have audited the performance report of Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. on pages 3 to 15, which comprises the entity information, the statement of service performance, the statement of financial performance and statement of cash flows for the year ended 31 March 2024, the statement of financial position as at 31 March 2024, and the statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report.

Opinion

In my opinion, the accompanying performance report presents fairly, In all material respects:

- The entity information for the year ended 31 March 2024;
- The service performance for the year ended 31 March 2024, in that the service performance information s appropriate and meaningful and prepared in accordance with the entity's measured bases or evaluation methods;
- The financial position of Breast Cancer Actearoa Coalition Inc. as at 31 March 2024, and its financial performance, and cash flows for the year then ended

in accordance with the Tier 3 (NFP) Standard issued by the New Zealand Accounting standards Board of the External Reporting Board (XRB).

Basis for Opinion

I conducted my audit of the statement of financial performance, the statement of financial position, statement of cash flows, statement of accounting policies and notes to the performance report in accordance with International Standards on Auditing (New Zealand) (ISAs (NZ), and the audit of the entity information and statement of service performance in accordance with New Zealand Standard (NZ AS1) The Audit of Service Performance Information (NZ). I am independent of Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc. in accordance with Professional and Ethical Standard 1 (International Code of Ethics for Assurance Practitioners (including International Independence Standards) (New Zealand) issued by the New Zealand Auditing and Assurance Standards Board, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

Other than in my capacity as auditor, I have no relationship with, or interests in Breast Cancer Aotearoa Coalition Inc.

Restrictions of use of this Independent Auditor's Report

This report is made solely to the Management Committees, as a body. My audit work has been undertaken so I might state to the Management Committee those matters which I am required to state to them in an auditor's report and for no other purpose. To the fullest extent permitted by law, I do not accept or assume responsibility to anyone other than the Management Committee as a body, for my audit work, for this report, or for the opinions I have formed.

The Responsibility of the Management Committee for the Performance Report

The Management Committee are responsible on behalf of the entity for determining that the Tier 3 (NFP) Standard is acceptable in the entity's circumstances and, for:

- The selection of elements/aspects of service performance, performance measures and/or descriptions and measurement bases or evaluation methods that present service performance information that is appropriate and meaningful in accordance with Tier 3 (NFP) Standard;
